

The University of Zurich Student Union (VSUZH) is the official representative body for all U7H students. We are committed to ensuring that your concerns are heard at the university - by the rector, the administration, in the media or on specific issues such as tuition fees. lack of study space, podcasts for all or fair examination conditions

We are dedicated to creating good conditions for studying, a diverse university landscape and a university that is shaped by its students. Issues such as sustainable education, an inclusive campus life and financial relief are particularly close to our hearts - as are the little things that evervdav life better: the affordable mate vending machine at the Platte14 cultural programme and our free legal advice service.

We also take the campus spirit seriously: we organise events and support student projects, from large parties to film evenings, pub quizzes, exchange events and awareness workshops.


Together with the study associations and the student organisations (StudOrgs), we ensure a lively, connected everyday university life.

It would be impossible to present the entire range of activities here. You can find an overview of cultural and student activities at UZH and ETH here:



Study Associations

Your network in your field of study



There is a study association for almost every subject at UZH. These student associations represent the interests of students vis-à-vis lecturers, institutes and faculties and make campus life more colourful. They are your first point of contact if you have questions about your degree programme, need support or are simply looking to make friends.

Study associations regularly organise events, ranging from first-semester aperitifs to study and exam tips to legendary parties, brunches and game nights. Many have their own rooms where you can study, drink coffee or meet new people.

The study associations are democratically organised and run by committed students. Their executive committees usually meet once a month. Once a year, a general meeting is held at which all members can have their say. New faces are always welcome – whether you just want to check it out or get involved yourself.

Do you find your subject exciting? Then help organise events. Do you want to make a difference? Then get involved in the study association to have more influence, improve conditions or create new opportunities.

What is What at UZH?



PRESIDENIT

Prof. Dr. Michael Schaepman has been Rector of the University of Zurich since August 2020. He is the public face of UZH and, together with the other members of the University Executive Board, is responsible for the strategic development of the university. You will hardly ever encounter him in your everyday student life, but if student issues do arise at this level, we at will VSUZH take care of the negotiations for you.

DEANI'S OFFICE

Each faculty at UZH has its own (academic) dean's office. It handles organizational matters related to studies: module registration, credit transfer exams. degrees. etc Communication hetween the university and students also often takes place via the dean's office. If you have questions and are unable to find an answer, the dean's office is a good first point of contact, and if it is not responsible for your issue, you will be referred to the appropriate office.

KANZLEI

The office will assist you throughout studies with administrative matters that are not specific to your subject. It is responsible for semester registration, semester fee invoices, issuing your student ID card (UZH changes to your degree program or course, requests for leave of absence and internships, and various certificates. In short: if it does not directly concern your subject but rather general study matters, the registrar's office is the right place for vou.

CENITRAL IT

The university involves a lot of technology—but don't worry, you'll quickly get the hang of it. The Central IT Department (ZI) is your point of contact if you have technical questions or need support. It offers you:

- IT support via email, phone, or onsite at Schönberggasse 2
- Access to discounted software for your studies
- Information about Wi-Fi, VPN, printing options, and more
- Continuing education courses on IT topics (tip: register early!)

STUDENT ADVISORY SERVICES

Sometimes. everything goes not according to plan during your studies: perhaps you are unsure about your choice of major, are considering a change, or simply don't know how to everything. iuggle The Central Student Advisorv Service offers interdisciplinary and interfaculty advice on precisely these issues.

STUDENT FINANCIAL AID OFFICE

Studying costs money—not just time and energy, but also money. The good news is that you don't have to do it all on your own. The Student Finance Office can advise you on any questions you may have about money. It arranges scholarships, interest-free loans, and hardship loans, and helps you assess what support you are eligible for. Even if you are unsure whether you are eligible, it is better to ask too many questions than too few.

STUDY & FAMILY

Studying with children is challenging—but it can be done. UZH promotes a family-friendly culture and supports students with childcare responsibilities through a range of services.

The kihz foundation (Kinderbetreuung im Hochschulraum Zürich) provides access to a comprehensive network of childcare options.

The UZH family portal also offers you bundled information and advice on topics such as parental leave, balancing studies and family life, and part-time models.

CAREER SERVICES

Want to know which jobs match your degree? Or how to apply successfully? Career Services acts as an interface between the world of work and the university, supporting you with a wide range of workshops on job applications and CV checks, as well as individual advice on career paths during and after your studies. They also connect you with potential employers through events, fairs, and a job platform.

LANGUAGE CENTER

Whether for your studies, a stay abroad, or simply out of curiosity, you can learn over 15 languages at various levels at the Language Center, Most courses cost between CHF 80 and CHF 150 for UZH students, depending on the course format, but there are also free courses available. Many courses earn you ECTS credits. In addition tο semester courses. intensive courses are also offered during the lecture-free period, as well as courses on academic writing. Places are in high demand - early registration is a must!

The FDI (Equality. Diversity Inclusion) department is UZH's central office for equality, diversity, and inclusion. It advises all members of the university on related questions and concerns. It works on behalf of the Executive Board, manages the affairs ٥f the relevant U7H committees, and actively promotes structural improvements.

DISABILITY OFFICE

Studying with a chronic illness or disability can present additional challenges—but no one should have to forego education because of this. The Office for Students with Disabilities (FSB) supports you in overcoming these obstacles. Its goal is to make the university accessible to everyone.

The FSB provides confidential and individual advice. For example, if vou for reasonable wish to vlaga adjustments for students with disabilities or chronic illnesses (NTA). Depending on the situation, such compensation may include additional exam time, different exam formats, or conditions. PROTECTION AGAINST SEXUAL HARASSMENT

LEGAL ISSUES

The UZH Legal Service handles legal matters for the university itself and rarely comes into direct contact with students. It is not responsible for cases of exam cheating or plagiarism; these are handled by the university attorney and the disciplinary committee. Appeals against exam results are also usually handled directly by the faculties—the Legal Service is only consulted in more complex cases.

Sustainability at UZH

In its Sustainability Policy, UZH has set out how it intends to tackle the challenge of global sustainable development. In its accompanying Implementation Strategy 2030, the UZH sets goals for its own actions, including the goal of climate neutrality.

In centres of excellence, research focus areas and individual departments, researchers develop knowledge that is important for sustainable development, for example on the subject of human rights. You can find courses related to sustainability topics via the «Green VVZ».

UZH also contributes to sustainable development in its operational processes, for example through photovoltaic systems on roofs, vegan menus as standard in the canteens and the completely vegetarian/vegan canteen «Rämi 59». Since 2025, the «Butcher» menu line has also become «No-Butcher» on Mondays.





Every two years, UZH reports on its progress in its sustainability report – the current report was published in 2025 covering the years 2023 and 2024. The central point of contact for sustainability at UZH is the Sustainability Hub. All faculties and groups at UZH, including students, are also represented on the Sustainability Commission. The Sustainability Newsletter provides regular updates on sustainability at UZH.

HOW CAN STUDENTS CONTRIBUTE TO SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

There are currently around 16 student initiatives at UZH where you can get involved in sustainability issues. The initiatives range from university policy issues to the annual Sustainability Week to the «Strebergärtli», an allotment garden run by students on the Irchel campus. Students can also get involved in sustainability initiatives at institutes or stand for election to faculty and university committees. On а platform for voluntary commitments. UZH members - from students to university management - share the personal goals they have set themselves to contribute to a sustainable UZH.

Location, Location, Location

KOL, AND, SOC or RAI – strange abbreviations or secret codes?

No, these are building designations at UZH. Very practical, but if you are new to the university, they don't really help you much – unless you know how to read them.

The UZH is not a campus in the traditional sense, but is scattered throughout the city: from the centre on Rämistrasse to Irchel, Oerlikon and Schlieren. While the buildings at Irchel are relatively close together, the locations in the centre and especially in Oerlikon are sometimes spread over several blocks. You should definitely take this into account if you have lectures in different locations one after the other – the change sometimes takes longer than you think.





Finding your way around can be a real challenge, especially at the beginning. But it's worth getting to know the buildings, shortcuts and routes little by little. This will help you find places to study, good cafeteria spots or quiet corners such as Irchelpark more quickly. Soon you'll find your own favourite place.

Locations

To help you find your way around between locations, here are the most important public transport tips:

TRAM STATIONS CITY CAMPUS

- «ETH/Universitätsspital» from above
- «Kantonsschule» and «Neumarkt» von below
- «Platte» and «Voltrastrasse» for buildings further up (e.g. Careum)

TRAM STATIONS IRCHEL

- «Milchbuck» for a pleasant walk through the Irchelpark
- «Universität Irchel» if you need to get there quickly

TRAM STATIONENS OERLIKON

- «Leutschenbach» or «Bahnhof Oerlikon Ost» for BIN and AND
- «Bahnhof Oerlikon Ost» or «Bahnhof Oerlikon» for AFL

POLYBÄHNLI

GA and ZVV-Pass are valid on the Polybahn. Single journey: CHF 1.20 (Please note: it only operates until 9 p.m. Monday to Friday!)

SHUTTLE BUS

During the half-hour breaks in the morning and afternoon, as well as at lunchtime, free buses run between the city centre and Oerlikon.

Study Spaces

From favourite spots to learning routines

Finding the right place to study is almost an official part of university life and can be a real challenge depending on the time of year. Whether at home. in vour favourite café, on a picnic blanket in the park or in one of the many university libraries - you will have to find out for vourself where you study best. Many students find that studying together with others helps them - they are more likely to stick with it, can exchange ideas and are better able to separate study time from leisure time. For others, however, studying together is more of a distraction. Try out what works for you!

There is not (yet) a complete list of all study areas at UZH, so a little spirit of discovery is required. You will find different types of study areas in the libraries, in many buildings, in study lounges or in quieter corners of corridors and hallways. If you want to work in complete peace and quiet, the quiet study areas in the libraries are the place for you.

There are dedicated group rooms for group work, some of which can be reserved – for example, at Irchel or in the centre. And sometimes, a table with a power socket is all you need to concentrate on a task, for example in the cafeteria, the Lichthof or a café near UZH.

It is worth taking a few exploratory tours of your faculty or the campus early in the semester.



University is a place where you not only acquire specialist knowledge, but also learn how to learn. For many, this is quite a change from secondary school. If you find learning difficult, you can find tips and offers relating to learning and working at university on the UZH website:

City Campus

Daydreams, sprint duels and coffee oases – places to study in the middle of the university jungle

The City Campus offers a colourful mix of study areas. It's worth staying curious and wandering through the buildings away from your usual favourite spot – that way, you'll always have a Plan B ready when things get tight.

For the experienced

The Central Library. If you don't feel like dragging yourself up to the KOL building, but are willing to cuddle up to complete strangers at 7:45 in the morning, to then throw your bags down and grab seats in a synchronised sprint when the doors open: welcome. Good footwear, locker skills and well-rehearsed team tactics are an advantage here if you want to grab a study spot together.

For high achievers

The Uniturm. The smaller study rooms on floors K and L feel almost like secret places – with a view, light and the feeling of "I know my way around here." Right next door, there's a relaxation room for a quick power nap.

For early birds and night owls

There are two libraries in the main building: the larger Economics Library and the cosier Philosophy Library. Both are strategically located between the lecture hall, cafeteria and coffee station. Bonus for early and late learners: with your UZH Card, you can enter as early as 7 a.m. on weekdays and stay until 10 p.m.

For the resistant

Studying in the Lichthof is like working in a market square – with charm, coffee and a certain amount of background noise. There is no library silence here, but it's a great place to observe who is currently desperately working on their assignment or already on their fifth mate.

For those who like to take it easy, Sunday learners and medical students

Everything is a little different at Careum: microwaves instead of a canteen, sofas instead of chairs, coffee from a machine instead of a barista. Perfect for slow learning or group breaks. Those who are serious about their studies will find a study room in the basement that is open 365 days a year. However, the glass box in the library is only accessible with a medical student ID – or with convincing lock technology.

OGloriastrasse 16

For anyone with wheels, asthma or sore muscles

The centre and the RWI building offer easily accessible study spaces – even if stairs aren't your thing. Not everything is completely barrier-free (shout out to the RWI doors with their gym-level resistance), but with a little perseverance, you'll get through. Both locations have barrier-free toilets and handy tables without annoying table legs.

If the book is located on the other side of town, no problem. The free courier service will deliver it to your desired University Library location. Simply select the pick-up location when placing your order.

STUDY SPACES AND GROUP ROOMS

The University Library has around 3,000 study spaces throughout the city, which all UZH students are welcome to use. One third of these can be reserved online, including group rooms. You can find the reservation tool on the University Library website:

Anyone can use free spaces in the reservable area, but the person with the reservation has priority. Unused reservations may expire after 30 minutes. So if you are sitting in a space that is reserved according to the system but remains empty for 30 minutes. vou can contact the information desk. where the reservation will be rebooked for you.

Conversely, if you don't need your reservation or decide to study somewhere else, be considerate and release the seat in the system. Karma and your fellow students will thank you for it.

STUDYING IN THE EVENINGS & ON WEEKENDS

Most university libraries are usually open on weekdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. However, many offer longer access with a student ID card. This usually gives you access from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. on weekdays.

- Take notes: Not every slide ends up on OLAT, and not every point the lecturer makes is on the slides. At the beginning of the semester, find out which lecturers say a lot more than what's on the slides and where the slides already summarize the content. This makes it easier if you ever miss a lecture.
- Use the breaks: Lectures are long
 get up for a moment, get some fresh air, or grab a caffeine boost.

DONT'S

- If you have to leave early, don't sit in the middle—find a seat at the edge instead.
- A vibrating smartphone on the table annoys the whole row more than you think.
- XXL bags of chips, tuna salad, or kebabs are not appropriate for the lecture hall – your neighbors will thank you.
- Jackets, bags, and laptops spread across three chairs give the impression of a lack of solidarity – sharing is caring.
- Loud group conversations are appropriate in the bar foyer, not in the lecture hall.




Transdisciplinary Studies



Old-Timer Wisdom



«You always see each other twice. This also applies to your learning material. Your long-term memory does justice to this. Of course, getting to know the material again and again also has its appeal.»

«Find your learning technique: mind maps, continuous text, bullet points, flashcards, discussions, etc. Try everything out!»

«If you don't understand something, ask the lecturer: during the lecture, during the break or, for example, on OLAT.»

«It'll be written down somewhere, rarely works.»

«The texts are no easier to understand at the end of the semester than they were before. Start revising after the first lesson.»

«Old exams are worth their weight in gold – as are older students. Pay them well (e.g. with caffeine) – they are corruptible and poor.»

«During the exam: stay calm, proceed systematically, take some dextrose, don't let yourself get unsettled, and carry on.»







«Once during your studies, you are allowed to freak out, lash out wildly, tear your exam papers into little pieces and run screaming out of the hall – but only once.»

«Excursions are great – don't be afraid to take part in one during your first semester if the opportunity arises.»

«Charge your laptop beforehand, not in the lecture hall – power sockets are a scarce resource.»

«Parties, events and life outside the lecture hall are just as much a part of it. With the right balance between studying and leisure time, you'll last longer – and have more fun doing it.»

«Studying can be demanding at times. However, there are cancellation deadlines in the middle of the semester, allowing you to reduce your workload if it becomes too much.»

«Find allies: study groups, fellow students or older students are worth their weight in gold – sticking it out together makes everything easier.»

«It is completely normal to fail an exam or perform less well than usual. The important thing is that you learn from it – it's about the big picture, not every single mark.»
